What a difference twenty-four hours makes.

Yesterday as I looked out from my study window over what was the old Brymbo steel works the sun was shining and the colours of autumn glistened through the showers and there was even a rainbow for a short time. Today it's dull and overcast one of the misty days associated with late autumn, the days of mellow fruitfulness are giving way to the changing seasons.

This is also true in the church's year, we are coming to the end of the long Trinity season and moving into a season of reflection and remembering. Over the coming weeks we will celebrate the Feast of All Saints and All Souls followed a week later by Remembrances weekend.

For many this is a difficult time and will be more so this year with the upheaval, change and uncertainty that the Covid 19 pandemic has brought, but I'd like to share with you a few of my memories of this time.

It's not been easy to choose which ones to share with personal service in the QARNNS and then as an army wife traveling around the world, I have many to choose from. But I'm going to start with my earliest memories.

I was born and brought up in post war London, Armistice Day, 11th November and especially the 11th hour of 11th month was special even for a child. Everything stopped for 2 minutes silence. The Saturday closest to Armistice Day, started as a time of fun, from earliest childhood as a family we'd head into the city for the Lord Mayors Show.

Then, much as today the parade of service personnel, youth organisations, the Pike Men, Gog and Magog and finally the Lord Mayor in his splendid horse draw coach where interspersed with floats from which were thrown all type of sweets and fruit supplied by the numerous livery companies. I remember the joy of catching not just the sweets but an orange and the envy of those around you who hadn't been so lucky.

It was only many years later that I came to realise that the service personnel on parade that morning went on to parade in the Royal Albert Hall for the Festival of Remembrance that night, and the following morning lined Whitehall for the service of Remembrance at the Cenotaph. That the fun of the morning gave way to the serious responsibility of remembrance.

To remember is to re- member: to bring the past into the present. We face the changing seasons with all the uncertainty the pandemic has brought, but there is throughout all this a constant. God is and has been with us throughout and will continue guide us to become the church he wants us to be.

As we look back over the past nine months with all the curtailed celebrations and look forward to an uncertain year ahead, and the changes which we personally, within society, and as a church community may have to embraced to allow us to return to some semblance of normality. We should embrace the opportunity for change, looking to the past but moving forward to build Gods kingdom here in the Offa Mission Area
